

SUNDAY OF DIVINE MERCY HOMILY BY FATHER PAUL THANH VU Blessings of the resurrected Lord (John 20: 19-31)

"If I do not see the mark of the nails in His hands, unless I put my finger into the hole of the nails, unless I put my hand into His side, I will not believe." That was Thomas' statement before the other apostles' announcements of the Good News of the Resurrection. And even that is the challenge of atheists, those who rely on science: everything must be weighed, touched, measured, counted, verified through the senses. But we don't need to believe what we

have seen. Because that's natural. In life there are many things we believe without seeing. We don't see wind, electricity, love... But we believe that there is wind, electricity, and love.

How we believe is how we live. If people do not believe in the resurrected Jesus, do not believe in the resurrection, they will only know how to live according to the values in this life. And death is the end of our life. Because they only believe in the present life, people will find ways to have a lot of money, have positions of power, and have a happy and enjoyable life, even if they have to use deceitful or cruel tricks. At that time, people only think about themselves, and no longer think about the benefits, honor, and dignity of others. Today, through news on social media, we know that many people for profit are willing to manufacture fake or poor quality products. For example, using chemicals to preserve fruits and vegetables and food for a long time, but is very toxic.

Today's readings show the importance of belief in the resurrection of Jesus. If we believe in the Lord's resurrection, we will live according to the values He taught. In the first reading, faith in the resurrected Lord helped the early believers unite and love each other. They gave up everything and shared it with each other so that no one would lack anything. Communism also dreams of this ideal: everything is common, everyone is equal, regardless of class, creating an earthly Paradise. But over many centuries, they have failed miserably, because people are greedy, have the habit of looting, taking common property as their own, taking bribes... For them, death is the end. So they think: why do we have to sacrifice and suffer for what?

Faith in the resurrection also helps us overcome the suffering and challenges of life, giving us hope in what God promises. Believing in the resurrection also helps us not to be too attached to material possessions, but to know how to live a good and holy life to have a peaceful life, to create merit, and to achieve eternal happiness after. The feelings of joy, sadness, happiness, and suffering of life always give us a feeling of fear and loss of peace. Like the apostles who were saddened by the Lord's death. God knew that, so God appeared to them, strengthening their faith in the resurrected Lord. As a result, they were happy and found peace in their hearts.

Today is also the day to remember God's Mercy. If love is God's nature, then mercy is God's way of expressing love, a sign of His steadfast love. Mercy looks at sinners, does not hold grudges, does not take revenge with anger or punishment, but feels sorry for them because they have gone astray, feels sorry for them because they are going to the pit of destruction. Forgiving love is the greatest sign of God's mercy. God did not just die to pay for our sins, but also forgives all the sins we commit, just like God forgave Peter, the adulterous woman, the good thief on the cross... Diligently approaching the sacrament of Reconciliation means to express our gratitude and our respect to God's mercy that God loves best. Amen.



Saturday:

Second Sunday of Easter - Sunday of Divine Mercy

Reading 1 Acts 4:32-35

The community of believers was of one heart and mind, and no one claimed that any of his possessions was his own, but they had everything in common. With great power the apostles bore witness to the resurrection of the Lord Jesus, and great favor was accorded them all. There was no needy person among them, for those who owned property or houses would sell them, bring the proceeds of the sale, and put them at the feet of the apostles, and they were distributed to each according to need.

Responsorial Psalm Ps 118:2-4, 13-15, 22-24

R. (1) Give thanks to the LORD, for he is good, his love is everlasting.

Reading 2 1 Jn 5:1-6

Beloved: Everyone who believes that Jesus is the Christ is begotten by God, and everyone who loves the Father loves also the one begotten by him. In this way we know that we love the children of God when we love God and obey his commandments. For the love of God is this, that we keep his commandments. And his commandments are not burdensome, for whoever is begotten by God conquers the world. And the victory that conquers the world is our faith. Who indeed is the victor over the world but the one who believes that Jesus is the Son of God? This is the one who came through water and blood, Jesus Christ, not by water alone, but by water and blood. The Spirit is the one that testifies, and the Spirit is truth.

Alleluia Jn 20:29

R. Alleluia, alleluia. You believe in me, Thomas, because you have seen me, says the Lord; Blessed are those who have not seen me, but still believe! **R.** Alleluia, alleluia.

Gospel Jn 20:19-31

On the evening of that first day of the week, when the doors were locked, where the disciples were, for fear of the Jews, Jesus came and stood in their midst and said to them, "Peace be with you." When he had said this, he showed them his hands and his side. The disciples rejoiced when they saw the Lord. Jesus said to them again, "Peace be with you. As the Father has sent me, so I send you." And when he had said this, he breathed on them and said to them, "Receive the Holy Spirit. Whose sins you forgive are forgiven them, and whose sins you retain are retained."

Thomas, called Didymus, one of the Twelve, was not with them when Jesus came. So the other disciples said to him, "We have seen the Lord." But he said to them, "Unless I see the mark of the nails in his hands and put my finger into the nailmarks and put my hand into his side, I will not believe." Now a week later his disciples were again inside and Thomas was with them. Jesus came, although the doors were locked, and stood in their midst and said, "Peace be with you." Then he said to Thomas, "Put your finger here and see my hands, and bring your hand and put it into my side, and do not be unbelieving, but believe." Thomas answered and said to him, "My Lord and my God!" Jesus said to him, "Have you come to believe because you have seen me? Blessed are those who have not seen and have believed."

Now Jesus did many other signs in the presence of his disciples that are not written in this book. But these are written that you may come to believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God, and that through this belief you may have life in his name.

For example, the ACA funds all human resources support for parishes as well as leadership training and guidance for liturgical ministers, youth ministers, pastoral coordinators and even your pastor. Other departments that provide direct parish support include Communications, Building Services, Construction, and Stewardship and Development!

Additionally, parishes that collect more than their target goal receive that overage as a rebate toward a parish project. Parishes have used their rebates for a variety of projects including new playground equipment, a kitchen remodel, organ pipe restoration and more.
