Repent and Believe in the Gospel

Every day, social media brings us countless stories of crime. But in the bottom of the heart, people today want to erase all notions of sin. Speaking of the sense of sin, the late Pope Pius XII commented: "Perhaps the greatest sin in the world today is losing the sense of sin." Why are modern people gradually losing their sense of sin? The simple answer is that people are gradually eliminating God from their lives, to avoid being tormented by conscience, to avoid having to believe in God's words.

Jesus repeatedly denounced hypocrites: "You see the speck in your brother's eye, but you do not see the beam in your own eye." Indeed, hypocrisy is a form of covering up one's own sins, and they often accuse others, and consider themselves good and perfect people. But before God, everyone is a sinner. Saint John said: If you say that you have no sin, you deceive yourself, and consider God a liar, and His word is not in you. Because no one is perfect. Jesus once challenged those who accused a woman of adultery: Let the one who is without sin be the first to throw the stone. And they all left.

When we realize that we have sinned, then we will have a feeling of regret, and repentance. That's why Jesus' first preaching was calling everyone to "Repent and believe in the Gospel". Not only Jesus said this, but all the prophets, apostles, saints, and Mother Mary who appeared many times also called people to repent. Repent for what? In the first reading, the city of Nineveh believed in God's words through the prophet Jonah and repented and atoned for their sins, so they escaped God's punishment and the consequences of sin.

It's never too late to apologize. Whether or not that apology is in fact accepted as forgiveness. But at least, sinners express their feelings, and they will relieve torment of their conscience because of the sins they have committed. But when it comes to God, He always forgives, no matter how many sins we commit. Like the good thief on the cross, we do not know how many sins he had committed throughout his life, but with just one repentance, all his sins were forgiven, and God even promised him the Kingdom of Heaven. It's never too late to apologize.

What is good news? Why must we believe in the Gospel? Yes, the Good News is Jesus. The One who brings us forgiveness through His death and resurrection, the One who gives us hope to rebuild our lives, the One who promises us eternal life in Heaven. The Word of God is living, effective and sharper than a two-edged sword; those words criticize the feelings and thoughts of people's hearts. Enlighten us to see our sins and shortcomings so we can repent, be forgiven, and be saved.

Repentance is the beginning of the path to holiness. Repentance is not to be sad and bury ourself in our past sins, but to be determined to change to live better in the present and future. Repent to realize God's immense love, to respond to God's love for us. I wish every day we could pray to God and Mother Mary: Lord, please have mercy on me, a sinner. Mother Mary, pray for us sinners, now and at the hour of our death. Amen.

A Good Time for Fulfillment

There are some things that always come at the worst time. I've never gotten a telemarketing call and thought, "This is a really convenient moment for me to listen to a sales pitch." I've never seen the compulsory software update notice flash on my computer screen when I *didn't* have a deadline I was struggling to meet. My kids never come down with the flu unless it's the weekend and the line at Urgent Care is stretching out the door.

And I never, ever feel the calm, persistent shouldertap of the Holy Spirit without thinking, "Now? Now is not a good time. Can you try again when I'm..."

But then I stop and think: when I am what? When I am stronger? When I am happier? When I am smarter? When I am a different person?

When God calls us, He calls the person He sees in front of Him. "Come on," He says, and He doesn't mean "When you're finished" or "When it's convenient" or "Think about it." He means now. This moment.

This is what Paul is saying when he writes that "the world in its present form is passing away." He is saying that your plans mean nothing, the kingdom of God is at hand. Abandon your nets, let your catch escape into the sea. You're not who you thought you were, and you don't need what you thought you needed.

Your sins do not define you. Your fears are not fate. Your inclinations do not govern you. Your life can be changed. We live in the time of fulfillment, and fulfillment is coming for you — ready or not.

Why do we do that? Catholic Life Explained

Question:

Can a person (the mother, father, or provider) ever be forgiven for an abortion?

Answer:

For people of faith, any conversation of human sinfulness should always lead us to reflect on God's loving mercy. Because God's mercy is greater than any sin, the Church is clear that even those involved in the sin of abortion can be reconciled with God and the Church. To help make this grace more available through the Sacrament of Reconciliation, Pope Francis extended the permission to absolve someone of the sin of abortion to all priests in 2016.

Even with the grace and blessings of the Sacrament of Reconciliation, the tragedy of abortion and the aftermath of abortion takes a toll on everyone involved. Ministries of outreach and support, such as Project Rachel, offer pastoral counseling, support groups, retreats, and other forms of care. As Christians, we are also called to help promote this healing and reconciliation in all its forms.
