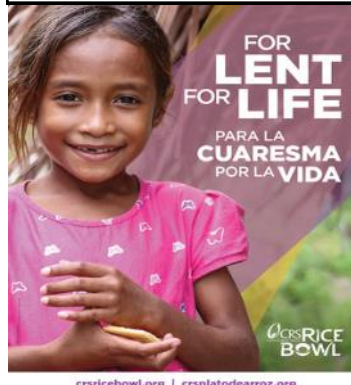
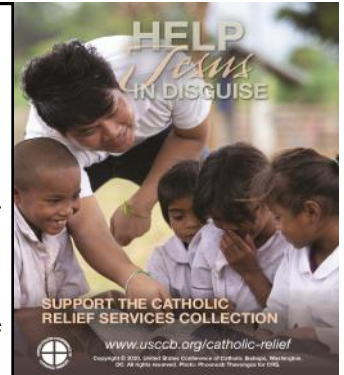

God Cares

You never really know someone until you know what's in their heart - what motivates them, what they're looking for, why they do what they do. In the Gospel passage we just listened to, Jesus lays bare the heart of God.

- Jesus is talking with Nicodemus, a member of the Sanhedrin, Israel's ruling body.
- It is at night - Nicodemus was afraid to come to talk to Jesus during the day-time, afraid to be seen with him. Maybe they are sitting around a campfire, or at a table with an oil lamp on it, casting restless shadows on their faces.

What message does Jesus give to this confused and fearful Jewish leader?

- The history of salvation, from the fall of Adam and Eve until the final judgment, revolves around the coming of Jesus Christ, the Savior, the Son of God. Why did he come? Because the Father sent him.
- Why did the Father send him? Because he "loved the world so much."
- God simply couldn't bear to see us perish in our sins; he longed to share with us his everlasting life. He cares. God cares.

And Jesus Christ is the definitive proof that he cares.

- He cares so much that he is willing to sacrifice his only Son to atone for the sins that have separated man from God, the source of all good things.
- We need look no further to find the very core of the Gospel:
- "For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him might not perish, but might have eternal life."
- No hidden agenda, no selfish undertones - pure generosity.
- This is the heart of God, of the Lord who longs for our friendship.

Only when we internalize this fundamental motive of God does our Christian adventure really begin.

Spreading the Joy (linked to "Laetare Sunday")

We are the lucky ones: we know that God loves us, that we are infinitely valuable in his eyes, no matter what, in spite of our sins, failings, and weaknesses.

- This is why every year, right in the middle of this penitential season, on the Fourth Sunday of Lent, the Church invites us to rejoice.
- This Sunday is "Laetare [lay-TAHR-ay] Sunday," the Sunday of rejoicing.
- The rose-colored vestments are a symbol of that joy, like the pink horizon that comes before a beautiful sunrise. We have had four weeks to meditate on our weaknesses and sinful tendencies. And so now we are able to appreciate more deeply just how full and unconditional God's love is - that while we were "dead in our transgressions" as St Paul put it, God reached down and rescued us. That's how we are in his eyes - that's the unquenchable source of the Christian's unquenchable joy.

We are the lucky ones; we know this. But what about all those people who don't know it? What about those people all around us, our friends, family members, colleagues, teammates - the ones who underneath a respectable appearance are searching desperately for a solid foundation?

- We all know someone like Nicodemus, who even though he was successful in the eyes of the world, was searching and unsatisfied in his heart.
- Christ wants that person to discover the joy that only God can give. And how will they discover it? If we tell them about it. We are Christ's messengers - imperfect, clumsy, ignorant messengers, but that's OK.
- Even fragile, simple, and misshapen clay vases can hold beautiful flowers.
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This week, let's show Christ how grateful we are for his unconditional love by telling someone else about it, so that the sunrise of Christ's love can illuminate their hearts too.

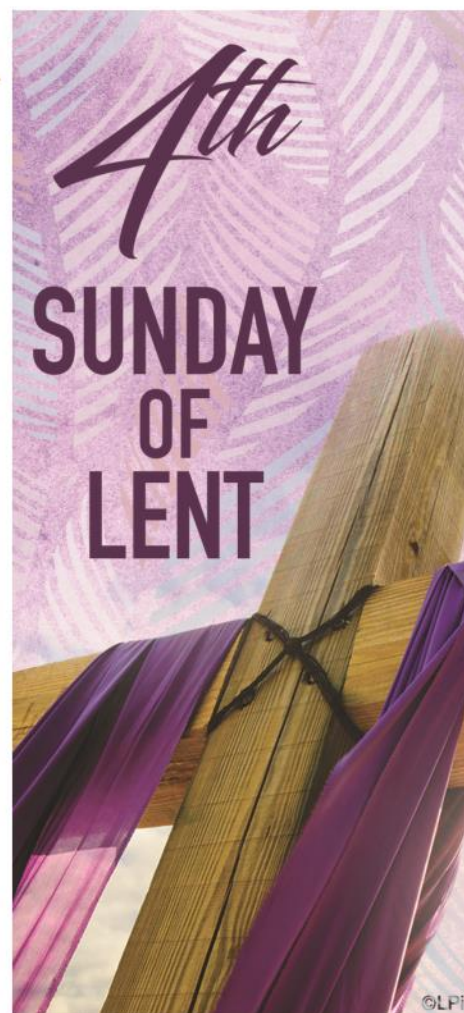

Every hand of compassion and mercy extended to a human being must always point back to God. The call always involves ordering our lives in accord with our truth and essence of being. As God never forgets us, we must never forget God. Now is the time to take stock of our infidelity and return to the light, even though it is difficult to look at.
