


Everyday Stewardship

My prayer for all my children is that they take the Holy Spirit with them in all that they do, and call on God to aid them in discerning their future. God Is All-Powerful (And It Matters)

One surprising thing about the parable of the weeds and the wheat is the calm, patient reaction of the landowner. This was a wealthy and powerful man - only wealthy and powerful

people owned multiple slaves. How do wealthy and powerful people usually react to enemies who

How do wealthy and powerful people usually react to enemies who try to interfere with their business?

Not with such calm and patience, but with quick revenge. So why was this landowner able to take this attack in stride? And we should not be naive - this was a serious attack.

- It will cause the landowner more than four times the normal amount of investment to bring in the harvest.
- They will have to harvest twice the weight as normal.
- Then they will have to disassemble the harvested bundles in order to re-assemble two separate sets of bundles.
- This was a smart and efficient enemy!

The landowner is able to stay calm and patient because he represents God, the landowner of the world.

- And God isn't just wealthy and powerful; God is all-powerful.
- And when you are all-powerful, no attack of evil can really bother you.

• As the First Reading puts it, "your [God's] mastery over all things makes you lenient to all... for power, whenever you will, attends you."

- He will use even the evil actions of his enemies to build up his Kingdom omnipotence is like that.
- An omnipotent God can afford to be merciful, because in the end, he will be able to put all things right. If we thought about this characteristic of God more often and more deeply, it would make a difference in our life. We would be more like the farmer in the parable, able to remain calm and patient in the face of life's troubles and injustices.

Our God is all-powerful, and it matters.

Throwing Our Sticks in the Fire

God's mercy is all-powerful.

- This is not only a pleasant thought; it is also a practical thought.
- Each one of us suffers from the consequences of our fallen human nature.
- In this fallen world, all of us are wounded by the sins of other people, sometimes in obvious ways, and sometimes in hidden ways.
- In this fallen world, all of us cause wounds both to ourselves and to other people through our own weakness, selfishness, and sinfulness.
- In the depth of our hearts, we know just how deep those wounds go.

So when we take time to think, to reflect on the state of our souls and the state of the world, we can easily be discouraged.

The wounds, the damage, the sin, the weakness - our misery is so deep and pervasive that fixing it is beyond our natural ability.

But we don't have to depend on our natural ability.

- God comes to our aid.
- God sends us his saving grace.
- It is God whose Spirit is at work in our hearts, as St Paul reminded us in today's Second Reading, renewing, healing, cleansing, and sanctifying us.
- God is all-powerful: there is no limit to his forgiveness and mercy no limit to his ability to give us a fresh start, to turn failure into success, to turn crucifixion into resurrection.
- Our Lord told St Faustina that compared to his all-powerful love, all her sins and misery were like a little stick being thrown into a blazing furnace.

Today Jesus will renew that all-powerful love for each of us in the sacrifice of this Mass.

When he does, let's throw all our sticks into the fire, and let him be our God.
